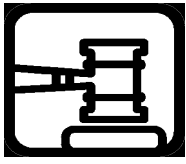

From the Co-Presidents

Hi, everyone, and the general election is upon us! This is the year for local elections, and our compatriots at the Times Union are busily putting together a Voters Guide for Capital District voters, including candidate profiles. Watch for it! We are finding, along with other Leagues, that Voters Guides have become activities that other organizations, particularly the newspapers, with more money and better distribution channels, are willing to do. We are fortunate that the Times Union is willing to take on this huge task (particularly during a local election year), and that they do a good job of it! For several years, our League participated with the TU in doing the Voters Guide, and we commend them for keeping it up.

If you read the article concerning the process for nominating Supreme Court Justices in last month's bulletin, you probably read with interest the article in the New York Times that said that, given the departure of the US Supreme Court Justices during the presentation of the case, it seemed unlikely that things are going to change – i.e. we will still nominate justices through party-ruled conventions of elected delegates. Changes in this process will be slow to come, apparently. Interestingly enough, on this year's ballot, our local Supreme Court Justices have been cross-endorsed by the major parties for the most part, presenting the voters with not much of a choice.

Have you ever tried poll reporting? If not, and you're curious, and would like to try it but are wondering what it's like before you go it alone, drop us a note or give us a call. There are many, many polling places and one is convenient to you. Chances are someone from the League is covering it and could take you along for a look-see. It's FUN! And you'll get to see the innards of a lever machine before they go the way of the dinosaurs!

Our lack of a voter service director and the tremendous amount of work that was involved in doing the Housing Authority Elections resulted in an unusually small number of candidate forums for a local election year. We'll do better!! We've become convinced that Public Access TV is key to making these forums truly informative for the public. Unfortunately, not many people attend the forums we sponsor, and sometimes even the newspapers don't come. Unless these forums are productive campaign tools for the candidates, they won't wish to participate, feeling that other campaign activities like going door-to-door and fund raisers are better uses for their time. PACTV can change that, and we're also investigating buying a digital camera to further promote broadcasting.

Remember – ALL POLITICS IS LOCAL, so encourage everyone to VOTE in this local election year, November 6th, 6am to 9pm.

League in Profile

I am a member of the League of Women Voters of Albany County because I was invited. Throughout my life I was aware of the League of Women Voters as an organization, its involvement in candidate forums, and providing basic information on voting registration and producing statements on national issues; however, I had never had a conversation with anyone who identified as being a member or knew how to become one. When I received phone messages in 2005 from the president, my first reaction was confusion. It seemed that she was asking for my assistance on a topic based on the fact that I am of African descent and live in the South End of Albany, not on any knowledge, skills, experience or that I was a home owner. After several more phone messages, we finally spoke so she was able to clarify who she was, how my contact information arrived in her hands, what it was the League was looking for, work it was currently doing and she listened to what it was I did for work, where my interests lay and apologized for some earlier assumptions which laid the groundwork for more positive interactions.

The incoming president contacted me for assistance in recruiting poll workers for the Albany Housing Authority election and shared information on LWVAC activities. She maintained email contact, informed me how many people were needed and promptly contacted them. After the election, she thanked me for my help, talked more about the League and invited me to be her guest at a Civic Theatre event providing all the relevant details. At the theater she introduced herself, introduced me to others engaged in conversation to find areas of common interest or people we knew in common and suggested I'd enjoy becoming a member. Without that level of contact, I never would have found myself at meetings let alone a board member.

A little about myself, I have been working in Albany since 1998 and moved here in 2003. I work for the New York State Coalition Against Sexual Assault, a private not for profit organization, as the Director of Policy and Education. The nature of the job requires long hours, last minute meetings and frequent travel which makes it difficult to be as active in local activities as I would like. In addition to working to end sexual violence in New York State, I also participate and/or am asked to speak at national events on related topics, am on the board of the Center for Women in Government and Civil Society, and travel as a Beyond Categorical Thinking facilitator and member of the Commission on Appraisal for the Unitarian Universalist Association. I have been part of community groups questioning the effectiveness of Albany public schools, how to prevent and deal with local violence and received a grant from Holding Our Own in 2005-2006 to create the Sankofa Sisterhood, a program for middle school girls affected by racism and other forms of violence. My personal passion is Filling in the Gaps in American History (FIGAH), Inc. which researches and disseminates information on people of African descent who do not usually appear in text books. We are working to add pages to www.figah.us and schedule presentations to share the knowledge.

Question 1: Federal immigration laws should take into consideration criteria such as the following (not listed in any particular order or hierarchy):

- a. Ethnic and Cultural Diversity
- b. Economic, Business and Service Employment Needs
- c. Environmental Impact/Sustainability
- d. Family Reunification
- e. History of Criminal Activity
- f. Humanitarian Crises/Political Persecution in Home Countries

- h. Rights of All Workers to Safe Working Conditions and Liveable Wage

BIG thanks go to League Co-Election-Managers Mary Ann Lettau and Nell Stokes-Holmes for teaming up with Maggie Moehringer to get the job done! We couldn't have been a better team, if we do say so ourselves. Many, many hours were spent preparing for the election and we all put in a very long day on October 9th. All of us agree that it was a great experience. In taking the ballots door to door for 110 disabled tenants, we got to meet many nice people, who welcomed us in, showed us their grandchildren's pictures and blessed us for coming – made us wonder why we don't visit these shut-ins more often.

And we learned a lot as a League about running elections. Planning and attention to detail are necessary to make sure that votes are counted correctly, that those entitled to vote get their chance, and that those who are not do not. Even with careful planning, we did manage to catch people who voted twice, and unfortunately had to void ballots for voters who didn't comprehend the instructions correctly. In our ongoing interactions with the Board of Elections, it's good to walk in their shoes every once in a while. So much effort and time went into these elections, unfortunately, that it somewhat sapped our strength for bringing together candidate forums this election season. So much to do and so little volunteer time!

Student Voting at UAlbany

You may have seen the article in the Times Union concerning a student protest at UAlbany against the Albany County Board of Elections (BoE) for "disenfranchising" students because a PO box number was not included in their permanent address on their voter registration form. Of course, students can elect to vote where they attend school, rather than by absentee ballot at their parent's home address, provided that they register on time, and file change of address information as their address changes (and we all know that students frequently change addresses).

The problem here had a number of aspects, which didn't necessarily come through in the TU article. We traded email with the student leaders, NYPIRG, and the BoE on this issue. It is not easy, according to the Board of Elections, to reliably get correspondence to a UAlbany student living in some of the on-campus housing in a timely manner unless a PO box is included. Correspondence from the BoE can be notices of where a student's polling place is, or notices that there were problems with registration or additional information needed from a student. Also, UAlbany is situated in a number of election districts, with different polling places, and it sometimes is necessary to assign students to a polling place based on their PO box number. Last minute difficulties with correspondence or assigning polling places can mean that a student doesn't make it on to the rolls in time.

Capital Tour....a Capital Time!

League members and friends gathered on Saturday, October 13th, to take the tour of the newly refurbished New York State Capital.

All of the publicity surrounding the cleaning and lighting of the Western Stairway is true – it's magnificent. We all were struck with the contrast between the sample of the stairway before it was cleaned and the rosy glow of the sandstone now. Smoke from coal-based heating and tobacco smoke must have done a job on lungs in that era also.

For those of us who had not seen the legislative chambers, the contrast between their beaux arts era elegance and the low-down chicanery that we read about each day in the papers was striking! It was hard to comprehend how the three branches of government – the high courts, the legislature, and the governor's office – could have, at one time, gathered themselves under one roof.

The Governor's Reception Area, down the hall from the ceremonial, and not so ceremonial, offices in which the Governor works, held a magnificent mural meant to depict one that might be on the interior of a dome (since our capital is dome-less). Figures from New York's history and mythology painted on the ceiling here remind us of how old a state New York is, how many phases of occupation we have seen – from the indigenous peoples, to the French, the Dutch, and the British - and how domestic warfare has figured in our past. We have quite a historical legacy to pass on to our children.

So an interesting and educational time was had by all, and we capped it off with lunch at the Pump Station restaurant – a great start to a beautiful day. Everyone agreed that we should do much more of this kind of fun activity. Thanks to Lori Keegan-Brady for bringing it together!

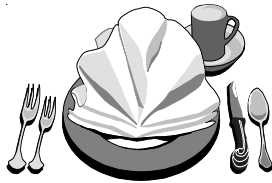


VoteSmart Bus Coming to Troy 11/17!

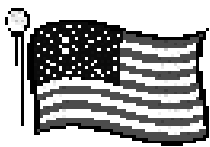

Naturalization Ceremony—Sept. 28, 2007

Ann Brandon and I, at the invitation of fellow League member Monique Roeth, attended the naturalization ceremony at the Federal Court House in Albany. Judge Lawrence Kahn presided over the ceremony that granted sixty persons from thirty different countries United States citizenship. At the same time he granted nine requests for name changes. Judge Kahn spoke of the US as a mosaic made up of immigrants from all over the world, and he invited these new citizens, not to give up their unique cultures, but to add them to the mosaic. Judge Kahn also cited the LWV as an excellent organization whose interest was in good government. League members Monique Roeth and Judy Gross-Johnson attend these ceremonies, which are held at least once a month, in order to register the new citizens to vote. Congressman Michael McNulty had been scheduled to speak but was unable to leave his duties in D.C. Judge Kahn invited family members to come forward to take pictures as he posed with each new citizen receiving his or her certificate, the US flag and a copy of the Constitution.
